Receiving

Gifts

The English word gift comes from the Greek word charis, which means "grace, or an undeserved gift."



The idea behind this is that if the gift is deserved, then it is payment. A true gift is not payment for services rendered; rather, it is an expression of love for the individual and is freely given by the donor.



You must be thinking of someone to give them a gift.



Matthew 7:7-11 (NLT)

Keep on asking, and you will receive what you ask for. Keep on seeking, and you will find. Keep on knocking, and the door will be opened to you.

For everyone who asks, receives. Everyone who seeks, finds. And to everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. You parents—if your children ask for a loaf of bread, do you give them a stone instead? Or if they ask for a fish, do you give them a snake? Of course not!

So if you sinful people know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your heavenly Father give good gifts to those who ask him.



Here is a simple, rule-ofthumb guide for behavior: Ask yourself what you want people to do for you, then grab the initiative and do it for them.

If your loved one has been critical of your gifts in the past and almost nothing you have given has been acceptable, then receiving gifts is almost certainly not their primary love language.

The giving and receiving of gifts in childhood can be a powerful expression of love, at the time they are given and often extending into later years.






Today parents don't always think of necessities as gifts but as items we must supply for our children.

What makes one person feel loved emotionally is not always the thing that makes another person feel loved emotionally.




Even if you're not a "gift giver", don't worry, this is one of the easiest love languages to learn!























Physical presence in the time of crisis is the most powerful gift you can give if someone's primary love language is receiving gifts. Your body becomes the symbol of your love.
